<u>Disaster Response Task Force Update (December 9)</u>

Work continues in the recovery efforts following Hurricane Helene's destruction in Western North Carolina. Thank you for your generous support in helping with this work. We are still encouraging financial contributions. There is not much space for physical donations and so we are supporting some of our partners who are helping neighbors directly.

Hands-On Service Opportunities

We are working with the Presbytery of Western NC to identify a specific community where we can focus our attention to assist with recovery. Once that is done we will be planning day and multi-day trips to help with clean-up, recovery work, and rebuilding. **If you are interested in helping to plan or work on one of these teams**, please let Robert know.

Some are finding opportunities through The Red Cross, Samaritan's Purse, and other relief groups, for volunteer opportunities. We encourage you to get involved as your schedule and skills allow. Please do not go on your own to serve without finding a group to serve with and making sure they know to expect you. This will cut down on wasted time and energy and will help the relief groups be able to be as effective and efficient. If you want to go and

We have learned that Presbyterian Disaster Assistance has toured the area and is planning long-term host sites. We look forward to connecting and working with them. Until then, please find a place to serve as you are able and as your skills/resources allow.

DCPC's CURRENT FINANCIAL RESPONSE

The Community Mission Committee has already made three financial gifts from funds that we have on hand.

\$2000 was given to Camp Grier to help them purchase a generator to run a walk-in refrigerator and freezer. They have been housing residents, providing hot meals, shower and laundry facilities.

\$4000 has been given to the Old Fort Strong Fund. They are trying to raise \$2 million to help uninsured home owners who have lost everything.

\$1000 has been given to Rumple Memorial Presbyterian Church in Blowing Rock to assist with their relief efforts in the Boone/Blowing Rock area. This is the church where former DCPC Associate Pastor Kathy Beach currently serves as Pastor.

\$4540 has been given to Black Mountain Presbyterian Church to assist in their efforts to feed community members who have been displaced or who have lost power and water and cannot cook at home.

Approximately \$1000 has been shared with Black Mountain Children's Home for the purchase of coats, hats, and gloves for children at the home.

\$2400 has been given to the Presbytery of Western North Carolina Relief Fund to help neighbors in need in their member churches.

\$6600 has been given to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance for their long-term disaster recovery work in the area.

Many other groups have gathered collections to share with those in need and we encourage that kind of collaboration and generosity.
